Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Group's governing documents are those of The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and The Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

How the charity is constituted

The Group is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts.

Trustee selection methods

The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

Organisational Structure

The Group is managed by the Group Executive Committee, the members of which are the 'Charity Trustees' of the Scout Group which is an educational charity. As charity trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities. This includes the registration, keeping proper accounts and making returns to the Charity Commission as appropriate.

The Committee consists of 3 independent representatives, Chair, Treasurer and Secretary together with the Group Scout Leaders, individual section leaders and parents' representation (if any) and meets every 2 to 3 months.

This Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of the appointments and is responsible for:

- The maintenance of Group property;
- The raising of funds and the administration of Group finance;
- The insurance of persons, property and equipment;
- Group public occasions;
- Assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adult support;
- Appointing any sub committees that may be required;
- Appointing Group Administrators and Advisors other than those who are elected.

Risk and Internal Control

The group has in place systems of internal controls that are designed to provide reasonable assurance against material mismanagement or loss, these include 2 signatories for all payments and comprehensive insurance policies to ensure that insurable risks are covered.

Objectives and activities

Summary of the objectives of the charity

The objectives of the group are as a unit of the Scout Association.

The Aim of The Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The method of achieving the Aim of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on the Scout Promise and Law and guided by adult leadership.

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects

The annual programme includes a wide variety of activities selected to help our members develop skills, knowledge, confidence and friendships as they grow from young individuals to become young adults. Activities include

- Camping and outdoor survival skills;
- Outdoor activities such as hiking, canoeing and rock climbing;
- Games and sporting activities;
- Arts and crafts;
- First aid and safety training;
- Learning life skills (eg cooking)
- Days out and theatre trips
- Teaching social, community and cultural respect and awareness
- Individual, team and Group challenges

Our members are encouraged to become involved involved in the local community through taking part in the local village summer carnival and parading at St Georges Day and at the village Rememberance Day service.

The programme provides opportunity for members to earn badges to show their progression and development and members are also encouraged to earn activity badges in their own time.

Public benefit

We welcome all young people regardless of personal background, faith, gender or circumstances. Inability to pay membership subscriptions will not preclude admittance to the Scout Group. We will make reasonable adjustments to meet the needs of disabled persons.

In planning our activities for the year we kept in mind at our Trustee meetings the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Volunteers

The Group relies on the assistance of parent helpers to ensure the safety and wellbeing of its members during Group activities.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements in the year

Despite the continued challenge presented by the pandemic, we are proud to have been able to deliver a full programme of Scouting activities througout the year while maintaining all necessary precautions in line with Government guidance. The Group continues to attract new members and finished the year with 80 members in total. The Dunstable District Scout Groups are the only region in the UK to increase their member numbers between 2020 and 2021.

We were also successful in appointing more adult volunteers in the form of a new Assistant Cub Leader and two Section Assistants for our Beaver Colony.

The village carnival was held on the Augut bank holiday weekend. It was anticipated the change from the usual date in July, the fact the Carnival procession was not going ahead, and the continued concern due to the pandemic would result in much lower attendance, and supplies for the group BBQ stand were reduced accordingly. To our surprise the attendance on the day was very high and stall was a sell-out.

The highlight of the year was the Group camp held on the last weekend in September at Phasels Wood near Kings Langley. Planned at relatively short notice, we had 70 Beavers, Cubs and Scouts attending for a weekend of fun and activities including rifle shooting, archery, water rockets, campfires, a huge inflatable assault course, the cresta run and a massive water slide. All that attended went home tired, muddy, smelly, and very very happy.

Financial review

In the year ended 31 December 2021 the Group had a net cash deficit of $\pounds403$ and as at 31 December 2021 the Group had cash reserves of $\pounds18,430$.

Reserves policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the charitable activities of the group should income and fundraising activities fall short. The Group Executive Committee considers that the group should hold a sum equivalent to 12 months running costs - circa \pounds 5000.

The Group also has the responsibility to maintain the Scout Hut in good condition for the benefit of current and future members: the Group Executive Committee considers it prudent to carry a reserve of £3000-£5000 against contingent repairs.

TREASURER'S REPORT Year Ended 31 December 2021

These accounts are prepared on a Receipts and Payments basis and report the income and expenditure based on the cashflows in and out of the group in the year.

At the start or 2021 there was still a lot of uncertainty with the pandemic and whether face-to-face Scouting could continue through the winter months. Bolstered by the grant funds received in 2020, we took the decision not to charge membership subs in the first term of the year. As the restrictions were gradually lifted and we coud return to a regular and more usual Scouting programme we returned to charging subs for the Summer and Autumn terms.

Despite the lower income from subscriptions, the Group's financial position was supported by income generated from other sources including:

- sale of old patrol tents, generating proceeds of £750
- donation from the St Mary's Carnival of £100
- despite expecting a lower turnout, the village carnival was extermely well attended and the Scout BBQ generated a net profit of £739, which was split 50:50 with the District Explorers group.
- the Group Camp in September had a much higher uptake than we could have hoped for with nearly 70 members attending across the weekend.
 While originally budgeted to breakeven, the camp generated a surplus of approximately £700 which helped pay for the new tents purchased for the weekend.

During the year the invested in 6 new four-man tents and a gas tea-urn, that all had their first use at the Group camp.

The Group finished the year with a net cash outflow of $\pounds403$ and total cash holdings of $\pounds18,430$. As we go into 2022 the Group still has around $\pounds5,000$ of the grant funds remaining which have been ringfenced for essential hut maintenance works.
